hanks to American Amy Stokes, a nominee for the 2011 CNN heroes, forty-five children from Nkosi Haven Village have formed bonds with international internet buddies, whom they e-mail and have video chats with on a regular basis. This stimulating programme is called Infinite Family.

Amy adopted a child from South Africa and through this process she questioned what was happening to all the other orphans and this initiated Infinite

Family, which officially commenced in 2006 with Nkosi Haven as the pilot project.

Berea has been part of the project since 2006 while the village has only been running with the project for six months.

"These children are being clothed and feed but still need guidance and that is where the mentors come in: to give these children a global perspective and to build their confidence. 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Tsogang Sechaba Community Project and Alexandra Child Care and Support Centre are also Infinite Family participants. The mentors come from 30 states in the USA and 10 other countries: Belgium, France, Canada, Kazakhstan and South Africa to name a few.

The mentors are carefully screened by security and background checks and go for training; learning about the history and

culture of South Africa in order for sensitivity to be displayed toward the child while computer skills are taught to the children.

The match-up between child and mentor is based on similar hobbies and career interests in order to find a mentor who will give positive

influences and direction to the child.

tame TIMES spoke to *Emily (not her real name) a 17- year- old female resident of Nkosi Haven Village who is net buddies with a mother of two from Pennsylvania. "We have our video chats every Saturday for 30

minutes and then I can e-mail her whenever I want to. She is like an older sister to me, I love our chats- she offers me solutions to my problems and teaches me so much about her country, telling me about the earthquakes and I have even started teaching her a few Zulu words.

It makes me feel special that she has chosen me out a whole lot of children to speak to and get to know, it's like we were meant to be together"; *Emily said.

"We find that the boys are really benefitting from it as we lack male role models at home and now they have access to males who can offer them what the female care takers can't. We have noticed the children's confidence growing", Gail Johnson, founder of Nkosi

Haven said.

mentors. I think it helps the children as sometimes they are upset with their caregivers and this gives them an outside person to open up to", Nonceba Ngxabi, the video co-ordinator said.
